FROM THE RECTOR ARE YOU DROWNING?

"There is a story told and retold in the Middle East about how to help someone who's drowning. The story goes that a man had fallen into a river. He was not much of a swimmer and was drowning. A crowd of concerned people wanted to rescue him. They were standing at the edge of the water, each of them urgently shouting out to him:

"Give me your hand, give me your hand!"

The man was battling the waves and ignored their urgent plea. He kept going under and was clearly struggling to take another breath.

And then another man walked up to the scene. He too cared about the drowning man. But his approach was different. Calmly he walked up to the water, waded in up to his knees, glanced lovingly at the drowning man, and said:

"Take my hand."

Much to everyone's surprise, the drowning man reached out and grabbed the fellow's hand. The two came out of the dangerous water. The drowning man sat up at the edge of the water, breathing heavily, looking relieved, exhausted, and grateful.

The crowd turned towards the man and asked in complete puzzlement: How were you able to reach him when he didn't heed our plea?" The man calmly said:

"You all asked him for something, his hand. I offered him something, my hand. A drowning man is in no position to give you anything,"

Let us remember not to ask anything of someone who is drowning."

I ran across this story, which comes from the Sufi tradition, this week and it really hit home.

So many people right now feel as if they are drowning. Harvey, Irma, Maria, Las Vegas, Napa, Sonoma. Fires, floods, shootings. It feels pretty chaotic. Zonnie and I had the experience of the Sonoma fires three weeks ago as we were driving home from Robert and Jessie's wedding. As we tried to leave Sonoma that Monday morning, we found ourselves with fire all around us.

And we were faced with roadblock after roadblock. When we did at last make it out of harm's way, we realized that we were a little traumatized by the experience of witnessing, even if from a distance, a vision of hell fire.

So many of us feel as if we are drowning. And it's not just these external events. I've been surprised in what seems to me like an uptick in personal brokenness. Marriages that are foundering, parent-child relationships that are conflicted, careers that are stalled. Older folks who feel forgotten by family and friends. All this brings with it shame. It makes us want to run away and hide. It's just exhausting. Whether it's a result of external or internal events or some combination of the two, lots of folks feel as if they're drowning. So what do we do? I was talking about all this with a wise friend earlier this week. We were acknowledging all the pain and trauma and shame that seems to be in the air right now, ad she said, "We just need to be kinder to each other. We just need to be kinder to each other." She said this with such passion and fervor. Yes! It really touched my heart. We do need to be kinder to each other. And that leads us back to our story. How was the drowning man at last saved? NOT by the well-meaning people on the shore who said, "Hey, if you need any help, just let me know. Reach out your hand." The drowning man was too exhausted and confused to do that. He couldn't do one more thing. It was the good fellow who reached out his hand to the drowning man. Who got in the water with him. He didn't wave at him from the shore. He got in the boat and rowed with him.

So if you want to reach out to someone who's struggling to stay above water, go to them. But don't ask them to give you their hand. Offer them your listening ear. Offer them your shoulder to weep on. Offer them your love. Release your friends and your family from the shame of their brokenness. Let them know you love them through their brokenness. Let them know you love them – and here's a hard one –because they are broken. Because you know what? You're broken too. Come to them as you are. Let them be who they are.

The Lord Jesus is always reaching out his hand to you. Will you take it? Will you be his hands and reach out your hand to someone who's drowning? It may save both your lives.

A LETTER FROM THE REV. KAREN HAIG

Beloved,

How to begin a last note to you? Some of us have been together more than seven years, some of us for just months, but no matter how long we've known one another, you – both as individuals and as a congregation – are written on my heart. It's hard to imagine Sundays without seeing your faces and falling in to your generous hugs. It's hard to imagine Wednesday evenings without hearing your words of wisdom and wondering together about who we are called to be and what wonderful things God is calling us to do. It's hard to imagine not baptizing your babies, helping you to find your way in caring for elderly parents, praying with you as you make your way through the joyful and difficult times of life. You mean the world to me and I will take you with me when I go.

Don't hold back because the leaving can be hard... we would never have had the glorious time we did, had we been thinking we shouldn't connect because the parting can be sad. It's important to remember that we will always be connected, that we will always be united in building God's kingdom right here on earth. It's been a little slice of heaven these last seven years, and there is no end to my gratitude. Let's continue to work together, bringing everything we have to offer to the work of making God's boundless love known to everyone. And finally my brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable, if anything is excellent or praiseworthy, think about such things, and the God of peace will be with you." *Philippians 4:8*.

Financial Report – Year to Date as of 9/30/17

Income

- Pledge contributions were behind plan by approximately \$36,000 year to date. The Finance Committee and Vestry encourage all parishioners to be sure that their pledges are kept current.
- Non-pledge contributions (plate, contributions and donations) were ahead of plan year to date by \$30,000.
- Endowment & Bequest were behind plan year to date by \$8,949.
- Lease revenue was ahead of plan because of an early lease payment by St. Thomas School.
- ELC Debt Reduction Contributions are behind plan year to date. These funds are important because they were calculated into the loan payoff.
- Overall income is ahead of plan by over \$9,050 year to date. (This does not include the gifts made to retire the debt on the Ebsworth Life Center, which were not part of the approved plan.)

Expenses

• Although expenses for building maintenance, outreach activities and fellowship events were higher year to date, overall expenses were approximately \$51,000 lower than plan year to date. In addition, we are \$15,000 ahead of plan on other income - building use fees, which also helped to lower our overall expenses.

Year End Forecast

• The Treasurer, Finance Committee and Chief Operating Officer are optimistic that we will end the year in the black, or at least break even, if pledges meet projections and we continue to control expenses.

Cash Position

- As of September 30th, the parish had \$211,882 of cash on hand of which approximately \$42,000 is restricted for the Rector Sabbatical. This compares to \$129,276 of cash on hand for the prior year as of 9/30/16. Current cash on hand equates to 52 days of operating cash based on the 2017 Financial Plan for Mission. We are working toward a goal of maintaining 120 days of working cash on hand.
- The St. Thomas Legacy Foundation had \$673,889 in its various endowments and reserve funds as of September 30th, which is approximately the same as the corresponding period last year.

The Rector and Vestry extend their thanks and gratitude for your faithful financial support as we work to achieve our mission of knowing Jesus Christ and making Christ's transforming love known to our community and beyond.
